Ground Skink

Ground Skink (Scincella lateralis) - Pl.8

Identification: 3" - 5 3/4". The Ground Skink is the smaller of the two species of skink in our region, with a proportionately longer tail (when intact). It has a brown back bordered by a black dorsolateral stripe. In some Ground Skinks, the back is almost as dark as the stripe. The underside is pale.

Where to find them: The Ground Skink prefers wooded areas, and is typically found in leaf litter and other forest floor debris.

When to find them: Active May through September.

Range: Eastern Southern Region, west to eastern Camden, Gloucester, and Cumberland Counties; northern quarter of Cape May County. All of Burlington, Ocean, and Atlantic Counties. Most of Monmouth County in the Northern Region.

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Key Features

- Smooth brown to black skin.
- Dark dorsolateral stripe runs from the eye, along the body, & onto the tail.
- Proportionately longer tail than five-lined.
